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1. ADMISSIONS

What are the guidelines for admissions?

Are there waiting lists?

There are application lists in most years. We do however see many students arrive and depart throughout the school year so it is always worth contacting us to discuss availability of places. The applicants are placed on the application list according to the date at which you submit your application. Therefore the earlier you apply the greater your chances of obtaining a place.

Is there an application fee?

Yes. There is a non-refundable, non-deferrable application fee of 250 CHF per child.

Is there an entrance exam?

There is no entrance examination, however, the school may request further relevant information, administer placement tests or request an extra interview with applicants if deemed necessary.

Is there a deadline for applications?

There is no deadline for applications. We accept applications throughout the year and allocate places subject to the availability of places. Parents can also apply in advance for future academic years. The earlier your application is submitted, the higher your chances would be of obtaining a place.

When will I know if my child has been accepted?

For September entry, we start offering places after the completion of our re-enrollment process (at the end of March) and continue to offer places as and when they become available throughout the summer until the end of August.

For certain classes which are not dependent on departures we may offer places as early as February. For children joining us after the beginning of the school year in September, you should know whether your child has been accepted within 2-3 weeks, dependent on availability of places.

Does the school offer financial assistance, bursaries or scholarships?

Bursaries are normally for one year only and are for students who are already attending the International School of Geneva. Does the school offer After School Care?

We offer an After School Care programme for our Early Years and Primary students. Within after school care, children have the opportunity to take part in a variety of fun activities which will have been carefully planned by the After School Care Coordinator and After School Care Assistants.

Does the school have a variety of sports and after-school activities on offer?

Our school offers a very wide programme of sporting and cultural activities. The aim is to develop the students as individuals, enrich their learning experience and widen their horizons and develop their teamwork abilities. Each campus provides a variety of competitive and recreational sports



available, coordinated by the Sports Directors. Also available for our Early Years and Primary students is After School Care.

Some examples of our extra-curricular activities*:

Climbing wall, pottery, badminton, film production, debating club, table tennis, theatre, swimming, choir, ballet, multisports, basketball, athletics, mother tongue tuition in a range of languages, music tuition

What is the average class size?

Across the Foundation class sizes are limited to 22 students for Pre-Reception and Reception. For Years 1 to 11 the maximum size is 24 students.

The maximum size of examination groups in Years 12 and 13 will normally be limited to:

- a) 18 students for courses that normally have 5 or more periods per week.
- b) 22 students for courses of less than 5 periods per week.
- c) The size of mixed groups (different exam targets or different I.B. levels) will normally be limited to 18 students.

What are the main differences between the three campuses?

La Grande Boissière offers school-based Primary, Middle School and Lower Secondary School programmes and the Diploma Programme in French and English; La Châtaigneraie offers the IB PYP, IGCSEs, the IB Diploma Programme and Maturité Suisse; Campus des Nations offers the IB PYP, IB MYP, IB DP and IBCP. Senior students completing the ESP programme at Nations can follow the ASDAN programme. All three campuses offer a US-style High School Diploma.

Do you offer a bus service?

Yes, we offer a bus service at each campus, covering Geneva, Vaud and the French border area. For security reasons children under the age of 5 are not allowed to use the transport service.

How many students attend the school?

The International School of Geneva is the largest and oldest international school in the world. At the time of writing (September 2018) there are around 4,435 students enrolled. La Grande Boissière Secondary has 785 students; La Grande Boissière Middle has 530 students; La Grande Boissière Primary has 530 students; Campus des Nations Secondary has 550 students; Campus des Nations Saconnex (Primary) has 270 students; Campus des Nations Pregny (Early Years) has 175 students; La Châtaigneraie Secondary has 1020 students; La Châtaigneraie Primary has 575 students.

Is there a holiday programme?

Yes. We run a variety of exciting activities at our Ecolint Camps in summer, autumn, winter and spring including: creative play; multi-activity; multi-sports; dance; drama; English through drama; French through drama; cookery; adventure challenge. We welcome children aged 3 to 14. Our coaches and assistants are highly qualified and mostly bilingual (French/English). Please see the following link for further details: www.ecolint-camps.ch

What opportunities are there for parental involvement?

Each campus has an active PTA. A variety of events are organised throughout the year including bake sales, book sales and bazaars. One of the highlights of the Ecolint year is the 'Kermesse' (summer fair). A truly international event which runs on each campus, with fun activities for children and delicious food available from different countries. Ecolint welcomes and appreciates parental involvement in different ways: through giving careers advice to students; giving mock interviews; helping on the PTA; offering work experience opportunities; providing expert help to the DG or the Governing Board; running workshops or giving presentations; helping with class trips to name but a few.

Is there a boarding house?

The International School of Geneva does not have boarding facilities. Students attending the school must reside with one or both of their parents or a legal guardian living in the Geneva area.

Do you have a dress code or uniform?

There is no uniform at The International School of Geneva, however, students are expected to dress suitably, comfortably and safely for a busy working day. Please check with your child's school Principal or class teacher for the requirements at your child's school regarding clothing for Physical Education classes.

How do you cater for children with allergies?

Children and young adults who are affected can lead a normal school life as long as there is good communication and cooperation between the school, parents, nurses and teaching staff. The Foundation's schools cannot provide a trigger-free environment, but we can work with parents to manage the condition, take sensible precautions and give appropriate support. How does the school communicate with parents?

Each school communicates with families via a password-protected section of the Ecolint website called the 'community portal'. You will be given access to this section once your child is fully enrolled. In this section you will find newsletters from the school principals, school calendars, relevant information and class pages. You will also find information about extra-curricular activities (music, sports, Mother Tongue programme, arts etc) in this section. Your child's class teacher will advise the best way for you to communicate with them on a day to day basis. When you enrol your child, you will be asked to complete an 'emergency card' by the school secretary - it is essential that the school always has access to your most up to date contact information. Communication about pupil progress takes place a number of times throughout the year depending on the age and stage of your child. This will be in the form of student-led conferences or parent-teacher meetings, as well as "open house" events in primary. You are welcome to speak to your child's class teacher at any time about pupil progress.

Where do the teachers come from?

Our teachers have come to us from over 30 different countries bringing with them a wealth of experience of national education systems. All teachers have mother tongue or high level fluency in their principal language of instruction and are expected to have mastery of both the Foundation's languages of instruction, English and French.

Is the programme offered different to that which is offered in Swiss or French schools?

How many different nationalities are there in the school?

We have a total of around 140 different nationalities within the Foundation.

Do you have a band or orchestra programme?

Yes. A wide range of individual music tuition is available in addition to the music lessons which form part of our curriculum. Private lessons are available in a range of instruments depending on which campus your child is enrolled at (e.g. Classical Piano, Suzuki piano, Jazz Piano, Violin, Cello, Double bass, Flutes, Oboe, Clarinet, Saxophone, Trombone, French Horn, Trumpet, Classical Guitar, Electric Guitar, Folk Guitar, Bass guitar, Drums, Percussion, Voice, Music & Technology).

In addition there are ensembles and several orchestras within the International School of Geneva.

We offer a range of different examinations/diplomas according to the curriculum programmes we follow in our schools. At La Grande Boissière, Secondary School students work towards the International Baccalaureate Diploma. At La Châtaigneraie Secondary students can work towards IGCSE (International General Certificate of Education), the International Baccalaureate Diploma and the Maturité Suisse. At Campus des Nations Secondary, students work towards the International Baccalaureate and the IBCP (International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme). The High School Diploma is offered at the three campuses. Do you have a programme for gifted children?



We have some specific activities for gifted students and we also ensure that the curriculum is differentiated to ensure that all students have an appropriate level of challenge within the classroom.

How does the school assess pupil progress?

Students are assessed through a wide range of formative and summative measures according to the age and stage of each child.

What is your homework policy?

Homework requirements and guidelines will differ according to the age and stage of the student. Please seek advice primarily from your child's class teacher for clarification on any homework-related questions. Well-designed assessment tasks should attempt to minimize external, material or culturally-specific influences that can affect student performance because they are suitable to some learners but not all of them. Homework assignments should not rely on the availability of equipment, home-learning environments and parent dispositions, but should focus on minimal resources and student-centred factors that have been established and monitored correctly in the classroom.

How do children manage when they have to leave and reintegrate into their national systems?

Very well. In general, the feedback we receive is that students are ahead of their peers in their national system though inevitably differences in curriculum may mean that different topics have been studied.



4. LANGUAGE LEARNING

Is the school an English/French bilingual school?

The school offers Francophone, Anglophone and Bilingual programmes, depending on the campus. <http://www.ecolint.ch/fr/programmes>

Is support provided for children who do not have English or French as a first language?

Ecolint prides itself on the cultural and linguistic diversity of both its students and teachers. It is therefore not uncommon for students to arrive from various linguistic backgrounds and require additional support in the primary language of instruction at their school. The aim of the English as an Additional Language (EAL) programme or French as an Additional Language (FAL) programme (depending on which school your child attends) is to support the development of academic and social language that is relevant to the needs of each student. Across all campuses of the Foundation, EAL/FAL teams ensure that additional language support is provided either in class or in a safe yet challenging learning environment which promotes student confidence and independence.

What other languages are offered and in which classes?

A third language is introduced as of Year 7: Spanish and German. Italian is introduced in Year 10

Do you offer a World Language programme?

Ecolint offers an extensive mother tongue programme. Currently, we offer Arabic, Catalan, Chinese, Croatian, Danish, Dutch, Finnish, German, Greek, Hebrew, Hindi, Italian, Japanese, Norwegian, Russian, Spanish, Swedish and Turkish etc...
